### **NEW RULES**

All farmers with pesticide private applicator certificate cards and all commercial applicators certified likewise are supposed to see their cards certification expire on June 30, 2020. However, in view of the disruption from the COVID-19 orders, the Commissioner of Agriculture has extended the expiration to September 30, 2020.

This will allow sufficient time for certified applicators to renew their certification by contact with the UT Extension personnel when the stay-at-home order is lifted or by completing an online training available at UT. See the following statement and information on training. The following is taken from the Tennessee Department of Agriculture website.

"The Tennessee Department of Agriculture is aware of questions regarding Continuing Education Units (CEUs) for pest control professionals. While managing the COVID-19 outbreak, it is critical that the department take steps to protect the health of pesticide applicators, employees, and the public.

Commercial and private pesticides applicators are required to complete a certain amount of training before renewing their certifications on June 30. This protects public welfare by ensuring that chemicals used in homes and businesses are applied by trained and certified individuals. The primary source for training is the University of Tennessee. However, the university has temporarily halted inperson training.

A new rule filed with the Secretary of State extends the certification period to September 30, 2020, or 30 days from the end of the emergency declaration depending on which comes first. The rule also deems General Pest and Rodent Control licensees as authorized to make Category 14 pesticide applications for control of COVID-19."

This is an important change for recertification scheduling, giving more time for applicators, both commercial and private, to receive the proper training that is required for those folks who use pesticides approved by the Environmental Protection Agency in their operations.

For those folks who wish to continue to receive the proper training while we are all on safe shelter at home restrictions, there is a great online option at the University of Tennessee that will work. It is called the K@TE Learning Management System, our distance education site. It is the best source for training, the fees are the same, and the training is good. I've used it and I like it.
