BEEKEEPER SCHOOL

The Duck River Beekeepers Association will be having their annual beekeeper school for beginners again this spring. The dates are March 9, 10, 12, and 13.

With the concern about bee losses and the effect on pollination of crops and flowers, this is a good chance to get started with bees and not only enjoy the honey but to help with the pollination of food crops.

PEST MANAGEMENT

Cold days are ending soon! (Well, we hope so!) As you begin preparing for warmer temperatures in the coming months, it is good to keep in mind that pests will be doing the same.

Spring cleaning is a great practice, being proactive about pests and preventing them before they occur! Pest management is not an additional thing on your to-do list. Just do what you do, but think "pests".

Think of it as cleaning to remove potential food from pests. And repairing leaks is actually removing watering sites from pests.

A big item is decluttering, which will remove hiding places and shelters from pests. (That's a big one for me. I collect things, but my family is after me to declutter. We'll see.)

Weather-proofing, usually done in the fall to avid the cold, should be done before insects emerge this spring. This will help prevent them from entering the home.

Safer Choice. What is Safer Choice? Safer Choice is the US EPA's label for safer chemical-based products. Every chemical, regardless of percentage, in a Safer Choice-labeled product is evaluated through EPA's rigorous scientific process and only the safest ingredients are allowed.

FARM SERVICE AGENCY

I was contacted last week by the Farm Service Agency in Lewisburg asking me to remind farmers that USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) encourages agricultural producers to enroll now in the Agriculture Risk Loss (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs. March 15, 2020 is the enrollment deadline for the 2019 crop year.

Until March 15, producers who have not yet enrolled in ARC or PLC for 2019 can enroll for both 2019 and 2020 during the same visit to an FSA county office unless yield updates are requested.

Additionally, farm owners have a one-time opportunity to update PLC payment yields that take effect beginning with crop year 2020. If the owner accompanies the producer to the office, the yield update and enrollments may be completed during the same office visit.

Farmers will want to take care of this. Some of our farmers deal with other FSA offices and the dates are same everywhere. This sign-up is nation-wide.
