#### **FARMERS MARKET**

### **AG ENHANCEMENT**

This popular program for farmers who need cost-sharing funds to make major capital purchases have the first week of October 1-7 to apply. Application packets are now available here at the office at 2105 Midland Road in Shelbyville, and the information and link to apply is also on the Tennessee Department of Agriculture's website.

Standard cost-share is 35% for most projects. There is a 50% level for farmers who have completed various Master Producer Trainings as noted in the packets.

If you have questions on eligibility and project requirements, the details are in the packets or the website. I'll be glad to answer questions after you have read the materials at 931-684-5971 or by email at jteague1@utk.edu

There's not much time left. Some of the projects require a valid Beef Quality Assurance certification. I have that training here at the office by appointment. Look at what you intend to apply for and determine the pre-application requirements.

## **NEW WAYS**

The new Master Beef Producer Program for 2020-2021 has been announced, and a new Master Farm Manager was rolled out last week. Both of these are online this fall. Each program has its own schedule, and both are offered starting in October. Both of these will provide for 50% cost-share under the Ag Enhancement Program.

Pre-registration is required. Forms with instructions and fees are available. Contact me for more details at the above addresses.

### **BEEF QUALITY ASSURANCE**

The new way to do this training is online. It is available now. I have the links and the information. The Tennessee Cattlemen Association is the sponsor and the group that certifies the training. This is a good option. Contact me about the details.

### **FARM SERVICE AGENCY**

This is a new version of the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program announced today. It is referred to as CFAP2. This is for eligible livestock that were affected by market disruption throughout the year.

This funding is in addition to the payments that were made before. The new enrollment period is September 21 through December 11, 2020. Those who received funds earlier are eligible to apply for this program.

For more information, contact Farm Service Agency. The office that serves Bedford County is in Lewisburg, and the number is 931-359-6268. They are operating under USDA and CDC rules and request that clients call first to discuss the program and have forms sent for completion.
