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County Spotlight Bedford County

The Bedford County FCE Clubs are going strong with 8 clubs and around 90 members. Our clubs were started in 1918 with 8 Home Demonstration clubs. Eventually we grew to around 25 clubs and well over 200 members. While the numbers are smaller, the clubs are still active in the community. Our clubs sponsor children to attend 4-H Camp, provide money for graduation expenses for senior students, make fidget blankets and walker caddies for nursing homes and hospice, make personal care packets for homeless people, provide donations of food for Good Samaritan Food Pantry and assist with the County Fair among other projects. Some of our special activities include 2 annual countywide meetings where everyone meets together for a special program like cooking or a guest speaker, a Share Fair where each club demonstrates a recipe or craft or idea around a theme (this year it was Junk to Treasure), and a Taste and Tell Luncheon for the officers and club presidents where they send in a recipe and then we have a potluck luncheon of the recipes. We also have occasional county craft workshops. This year the programs have included: Macrame, Gratitude, Resources for Senior Living, Tomayto Tomahto, Pies for Pi Day and Winter Wisdom. The Bedford County FCE club members have fun, learn new things and serve the community!

FCS Agents Special Recognition

Central Region recognizes the FCS Agents that are going above and beyond the call of duty to help FCE Clubs and Members within our counties. Please review the guidelines below and submit that special agent to be in the running for this recognition at the Annual Meeting.

GUIDELINES FOR TAFCE, CENTRAL REGION FCS AGENT APPRECIATION AWARD

This award recognizes excellence and honors UT Extension FCS Agents who have given over and beyond what might be expected in the performance of duties as an advisor to FCE on the county, region, or state level. The award will go to one individual within the Central Region on an annual basis.

GUIDELINES FOR NOMINATION

- 1. Nominee should be an extension FCS agent assigned with FCE duties.
- 2. Three (3) letters of recommendation and three (3) forms of documentation must accompany each nomination form. Letters of recommendation may be submitted by members or non-members of FCE.
- 3. The three (3) letters of recommendation highlighting the accomplishments of the nominee should include:
 - A. A stated reason for nominating the individual.
 - B. Examples of how the FCS agent (nominee) has actively supported or promoted FCE.
 - C. Accomplishments and participation in FCE programs, events, or training (local, region, state) within the last 5 years.
 - D. Recognition and awards obtained within FCE, UT Extension or other organizations.
- 4. Documentation is limited to three (3) 8½ x 11 pages (front side of page only). Support docu mentation can be newspaper articles, pictures, or other relevant information. Do not submit original articles or photos. Please submit copies only of photographs, articles, and other information. (Committee will not be responsible for, or the return of, original articles or photographs.)
 - A total of six (6) pages for both letters of recommendation and documentation.
- 5. Submit in a plain three (3) prong folder.

COUNTY GUIDELINES

- 1. Each county may submit one nominee. If the nominee is not selected as the region recipient, that individual may be nominated again by their respective county in another
- 2. An agent who has won this award may be nominated again. Any county submitting the nomination must wait a minimum of five years before re-nominating the agent.
- 3. The County Council President should submit the nomination to the Central Region Vice President for Public Policy by the region deadline of June 15.

REGION GUIDELINES

An independent panel of judges will be appointed by the Board to select the FCS Agent Appreciation Award recipient from the county nominees. The panel's selection will be based on the information provided by the nominating county (see guidelines above.) The FCS agent recipient will receive a commemorative plaque and a monetary award of \$200.00 from TAFCE, Central Region, to be presented during the Annual Meeting.

Saddle Up! is service project for 2022 TAFCE Conference

Saddle Up's mission is to impact the lives of children and young adults with disabilities by providing opportunities to grow and develop through therapeutic, educational and recreational experiences with horses. Saddle Up! is a PATH International Premier Accredited Center offering professional equine-assisted services that make a profound and lifelong impact on our riders. Saddle Up! annually empowers over 200 special equestrians ages 2 through 26 to grow stronger and thrive by employing a care team of trained instructors, therapists, therapy horses, and volunteers. Through participation in six equine-assisted programs on the 34-acre farm, Saddle Up! programs have a deep impact on the physical, cognitive, social, emotional and mental abilities of their riders. Saddle Up! is located in Franklin, Tennessee, and serves 130 participants weekly, has 22 horses on property, has programming Monday – Saturday, and runs programming year-round.

As per their wishes, monetary donations will help purchase equipment needed for their interactive vaulting program. Items include a vaulting pad, side pulls, safety stirrups, and larger girths. Clubs or individuals could donate when the "cowboy hat" is passed during the Saddle Up! presentation at the Tuesday morning General Session. Checks should be made out to Saddle Up! Our goal is to be able to donate \$1000 to Saddle Up! which we estimate would be approximately \$5 per attendee. Please help us reach, or surpass, our goal!
